REPEAL OF AUTOMOBILE TAX
When the session on automobiles was reached, Mr. Kirkpatrick asked the repeal of the tax on automobiles for pleasure as had been reported, and when answered in the negative moved that this be done. His motion was out of order and he withdrew it.

GEM HEARD FROM
Messrs. Cameron Morrison & Whitlock appeared in behalf of the Gem Restaurant, which Mr. Morrison said is taxed in about 10 different ways. "You have got us down," he said, "as a restaurant, a cigar stand, a fruit stand, a confectionary establishment, a lunch counter and a hotel. We have no regular soda fountain and while we sell some soft drinks they are mostly served in connection with meals. We think some special provision should be made in favor of a concern where so many sorts of business are done in one place. This amounts to \$250 in all."

THE TAX ON SOFT DRINKS
Mr. J. J. Adams protested against the tax on dealers in soft drinks, on the ground that it double taxes the manufacturer, and injures the small dealer who says he cannot pay it and buy less too.

MR. E. L. KEESLER OBJECTED
Mr. E. L. Keesler objected next to the imposition of a tax of \$25 on "all painters doing work under contract" on the ground that this would work a hardship on the man who does only an occasional job and that it would react to the detriment of the public.

MR. ADAMS AGAIN TOOK THE FLOOR
Mr. Adams again took the floor in objection to the tax on the bottlers of mineral waters, which he considered exorbitant. The trade, he said, is not traffic in a luxury, the losses are large and many are dependent on the industry for a living. He suggested a graduated tax of \$25 on businesses of \$25,000 or under; and \$50 on those doing \$50,000 or less down to the next grade, etc.

VARIOUS OBJECTIONS
Messrs. J. H. Wear and J. A. Fore objected to the tax on lumber dealers as a tax on manufacturers, which was unconstituted. Mr. J. M. O'Donoghue, the butcher, objected to the \$25 tax on butchers selling by wholesale, saying that this forced the public to pay a double tax. Mr. Kirkpatrick was emphatic in his denunciation of the provision taxing dealers extra when they were from the country. Messrs. Weddington and Pharr, hardware men, asked a graduated tax on dealers in hardware.

MR. W. R. CLARTY ELECTED
Board of Health Elects a Chief Inspector for the Sanitary Department—Other Matters of Interest Transacted
At a special meeting of the board of health last night, Mr. W. R. Clarty was elected chief inspector for the sanitary department and Mr. J. C. Traywick one of his assistants. The session was well attended, only Dr. C. A. Bland being absent. The most of the time was spent in discussing various topics relating to the health and sanitary condition of the city. Mr. M. L. Davis was ordered transferred from the sanitary inspection department to the food inspection work and placed under the special direction of Dr. E. C. Register. A motion was passed requiring that all orders for supplies for the health department be signed in duplicate by Dr. F. O. Hawley, city physician, and that the original be returned with the order. It was ordered that an investigation be made as to the cost of a number of garbage cans to be distributed over the city. The hour being late, the meeting adjourned until Friday night, when another session will be held.

AFTER ALLEGED MURDERER
Sergeant Pitts is in New York to Bring Home Charlie Johnson, a Negro Accused of Murdering a Colored Woman on Mint Street a Few Years Ago.
A message was yesterday received by Chief Orr, of the department of police, from Sergeant Pitts, who has gone to New York city as special agent to bring back Charlie Johnson, the negro who is accused of having killed a negro woman named Jordan on Mint street several years ago. The telegram was to the effect that some unexpected complications have arisen in the matter of necessary papers and a trip to Albany would probably become necessary.
