Appeal From the Kentucky Circuit Court Docketed in the United States Supreme Court—Ask an Injunction Under the Erdman Act,

Washington, July 15.—The appeal of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers vs. the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company was docketed to-day in the Supreme Court of the United States. The suit was brought by the telegraphers to secure an injunction under the Erdman act, which prohibits corporations from discriminating against labor organizations. They charge the railroad company with preventing their agents from securing interviews with the railroad operators and with threatening to discharge such of them as join the union, and this course they assert is a violation of the law. The decision in the Circuit Court for the western district of Kentucky was against the telegraphers on the ground of the vagueness of the charge.
