New York, July 21.—To the amateur boating world the feature for the week is the championship aquatic events, to be contested Thursday, Friday and Saturday at the Jamestown Exposition.

The program is divided into senior and junior championships. The first will include races ranging from 50 yards to a mile, a 20 mile relay race and a water polo contest.
