MYSTERY SURROUNDS DEATH.

Body of Musical Actress Found at Colorado Springs—Developments Indicate Suicide, Superinduced by a

Love Affair. Colorado Springs, Col., July 29 .-The body of Miss Laura Matthews, of New York City, and Kansas City, was found lying in a lane near Ivy Wild early to-day with a bulle, hole in her head. Miss Matthews and her maid arrived in Colorado Springs several days ago and took apartments at the Acacia Hotel. Last evening Miss Matthews ordered a saddle horse and rode in the direction of Ivy Wild. This was the last seen of her alive. Peculiar circumstances surrounding the finding of the body of Miss Matthews gave rise to the belief that murder had been committed but later developments indicate suicide.

Miss Matthews was a well known musical actress, 19 years old. It is said she had been engaged to a wealthy Chicagoan and was despondent because of his failure to fulfill his promise of marriage.
