COTTON SLIGHTLY IRREGULAR

Fluctuations Continued to a Comparative Narrow Range—The Close Steady, as Reported by the Chicago Board of Trade—Opening Steady, followed by Rally, and Then Fell off Again Under Liquidation and Bear Pressure—Trading Quiet After First Half Hour—Cotton Exchange Figures for 1906-07, 13,539, 948 Bales.

New York, Sept. 1.—The cotton market was irregular within a comparatively narrow range and closed steady, not unchanged to 2 points lower. Sales estimated at 150,000.

The opening was steady to slightly higher, but soon fell to a decline of 4 to 7 points owing to a decline of 4 to 7 points in the price of lower Liverpool cables than expected, but prices almost immediately rallied to about the closing figures of last Friday on covering and some buying orders. As soon as these orders had been executed, however, the market showed the absence of sustained support and sold off to nearly the opening figures under liquidation by early buyers and pressure from some of the local bears. Toward the close it rallied partially on covering of shorts but trading was very quiet after the first half hour and the market showed little feature. The weekly weather report was postponed until to-morrow. New York cotton exchange figures made the crop of 1906-07, 13,539,948 bales. Receipts at the ports to-day, 5,769 bales, against 4,103 last week and 13,451 last year; for the week, 40,000, against 22,360 last week and 73,500 last year. To-day's receipts at New Orleans, 255, against 361 last year.

IMPROVED TONE IN STOCKS

Active Demand For Wide Range of Securities Results in Rise of Prices—The Trading Largely Professional—Money Rate For Six Months Falls From 7 to 6 Per Cent.

New York, Sept. 2.—The stock market to-day gave substantial evidence of improved feeling in financial circles. There was an active demand which embraced a wide range of securities of different classes and resulted in a comparatively rise in prices in the course of the day's operations. The demand was chiefly largely professional and a large portion of the professional buying was for the bear account to cover short contracts. Besides this there was a professional but wary that was active on the long side of the market and which was a material factor in pushing the bears to cover. The strictly investment demand naturally subsided somewhat as prices rose away from the most attractive levels. There was sharp suspicion manifested over the early advance, so much so that room traders sold freely at the opening advances over "bear" prices. The professional short sellers were driven to buy stocks when prices continued to advance.

The relaxation in the money market was most pronounced in the time loan department where something like a collapse occurred. Bids for 6 months, which held obstinately at 7 per cent, asked, fell to 6 per cent.

Our market opened with reports of October at 12 1/2, 12 1/2, 12 1/2 and after selling at 12 1/2 and 12 1/2 ruled at 12 1/2 at 1 p. m. European markets showed a disposition to ease during the period when our markets were closed. Notwithstanding the absence of rain in Texas over Sunday, our market opened easier to recover the loss and closed steady at about the same prices as on Friday last, on rumors of further injury in the Southwest and in anticipation of a reaction in Liverpool to-morrow. The temper of the trade is bearish, though the movement of the new crop shows how late it is; and reports of shedding are coming from sections of the Atlantic States.
