Greenville, S. C., Oct. 10.—In the course of a lecture here to-night Congressman Richmend Pearson Hobson, formerly of the United States navy. made the startling declaration that promptly at 11 o'clock a. m. A good at-tendance of all the veterans is re-quested to be present. Business that will interest all to be transacted. Sons 200,000 veteran troops on the Pacific and daughters cordially invited to coast before the United States could prepare effective resistance, and fol-low them up with 200,000 more before this government could dispatch half as many over our trans-conti-mental rallroads, Japan is prepar-ed for war to-day, he said, but the United States could not get on a war

footing in months, perhaps a year, Captain Hobson said that the dis-patch of the battleships to the Pacific may save the situation for the United States, but he feared Japan would strike before the fleet ever reached mission to the grounds. He cited the San Francisco incident as an example and said that our backdown then was a wise piece of statesmanship, because it pre-vented a decimation of war, though it was humiliating to American pride and patriotism. 


