Detroit Oct. 12.—The Chicago National Leugde baseball team this offernoon at Bennett Park won the world's championship, deteating the Detroit American Leugue team by the score of 2 to 0. It was the fourth anoceeding victory for the Chicago team in as many days. Taking advantage of every slip made by the local players and running the bases cleverly, they scored 2 runs in the first two innings, while the Detroit team did not succeed in getting amover the home plate. The "rooters" who had followed the Chicago team from their home city, swarmed down to the diamond when the minth inning closed and showered them with congratulations. Them several hundred of them formed in line and marcael down Michigan avenue, headed by a band, cheering and singing in celebration of their victory.
