Big String of Mills Agree to Advance 8 Cents Per Pound on Cotton Stored With Them or Take the and Store It on Call-Offers to Farmers-Few Taking Advantage of the Offers so Far — Market Low and Money

The stringency in the money market and the current low price of cotton are two topics which are exciting no end of talk in financial and other circles. Ready money is at a premium and cotton values have about reached that point where they cannot safely descend much farther. In many cities and towns the local banks are hedging in order to pro-tect themselves, and the warehouses all over the belt are being taxed to their utmost capacity in order to accommodate the thousands and thousands of bales which the farmers do not care to throw upon the de-clining market. The seriousness of the situation dawns upon one when the several facts are considered jointly. The big majority of the farmers have mortgages and notes outstand-ing which represent a large portion ing which represent a large portion of the year's expense in making their crop and these are falling due now. The market is declining and no one wishes to sell, for better prices are sure to follow. Under ordinary circumstances such an one would store his cotton in a bonded warehouse and then, with the receipts and the cotton for security, i rrow the money of the local banks, ast here the money stringency pinches, for the banks say that they have practically no money to lend, and for that at least 8 per cent. Is demanded. Even then not more than 5 cents per pound could be secured. No farmer need sacrifice his cotton at current low prices nor pay 8
