Absurdity of Breach of Contract Illustrated by Possible Financial Communication.

The following, arranged in the form of letters, were printed originally in the columns of the Textile Manufacturers' Journal, October 13, 1917.

Our only excuse for reprinting them is that in their application to the present conditions, showing the absurdity of cancellations, carried into other lines of business, they have received publicity, and in justice to the author it is believed their true origin should be noted.

The letter and comments thereon follow: "As some of our largest clothing and cloak manufacturers are already in Wall Street, and more are going, we are in receipt of a few sample letters which, rumor has it, have surprised some of the older operators there."

"Referring to the purchase some days ago of \$10,000 Det. M. & M. 3-12s at 81 1-2, would say that they have not come up to our expectations, and we ask the privilege of returning same. We do not ask it as a matter of right, but in view of the fact that they are not suitable for our market. We know you will accommodate us and assure you we will make it up in future transactions."

"We purchased or your representative this morning 300 shares of Chicko-co, Rock Island & Pacific at 104 3-4. He now informs us that your price is 106. As we told him at the time this was only a sample order, and we can show you by our books that we have sold a large quantity on this basis. We certainly expect you to fill our duplicate orders at the same price and we ask you to let us know of your earliest deliveries of 10,000 shares."

"Referring to our purchase this morning of 1,000 shares of C. B. & Q. stock at 127 1-2, we have been offered the identical thing this afternoon at 126 1-4. If your salesman will call, we will verify this to your satisfaction and we will send you a credit memo for the difference. Also please send your examiner, as we hear from other purchasers that you have sold these goods short."
