Concert, Dec. 21.—Mr. Walter Thompson, for five years superintendent of the city graded schools, left last night for Statesville, where he will spend Christmas with his father, Prof. Matt Thompson. When school was dismissed yesterday afternoon for the holidays, Mr. Thompson made a short address to the children and expressed his regret at leaving them and his gratitude for their excellent behavior and friendly favors toward him in his long term of service, wishing them a merry Christmas, etc. When he had concluded his remarks, Prof. J. D. Lantz, principal of school No. 1, on behalf of the school children and teachers of the city, presented Mr. Thompson with a handsome gold watch, a token of esteem and love. After his return to the city the 1st of January, Mr. Thompson will leave for Philadelphia and New York, where he will study the needs and matters of conducting a training school. He will enter upon his work as superintendent of the Stonehill Jackson Manual Training and Industrial School at the beginning of the new year.
At a meeting of the school board held yesterday afternoon it was decided not to elect a superintendent for the schools for the remainder of the present school term, and the management will be left in the hands of the principals of the various schools, as at present.
