Rock Hill, S. C., Jan. 15.-Rock Hill will begin the new year by ushering in several new enterprises to her already large list. Among the new will be two bottling plants. Capt. William A. Graham, one of the most popular conductors on the Rock Hill division of the Southern, has a plant under construction on East Moore street, which will be in operation inside of thirty days. It will be known as The Rock Hill Bludwine Bottling Company, and will bottle this well-known drink, which is considered the finest soft drink on the market. This plant will, to addition to "Blud-

bottle all the sort grinks. Mr. Woods M. Steele, owner of the Steele Mineral Spring, has erected plant on East Block street for the bottling of soft drinks, including coca-cola. Mr. Steele intends to use the water from his mineral spring in

the manufacture of his crinks. There are many other new enterprises which will be in operation inside of six months. All the old ones are running full time, and the stringency of the money market does not seem to have affected us very much. A matter of much concern to Rock Hill citizens was the proposition made by President Johnson, of Winthrop Normal and Industrial College, ently to the trustees of the Rock Hill school district, offering through the trustees of Winthrop College to purchase the high school property, which was purchased last year by the trusof the Rock Hill school district and which is now run us a high school for boys, being situated opposite Winthrop College, President Johnson offered to pay the purchase price the school board paid for this prop-erty, including this year's expenses. The school trustees have not as yet given their assurance whether they sell or not. If the deal goes through it means much for Rock Hill in several instances. A model school building will be erected, which means practically free tuition to 300 or more children from the kindergarten de-partment through the tenth grade.
