### LENOIR PEOPLE INDIGNANT.

Becent Change of Schedule on C. & N. W. Considered Outrageous—The Road Returns Evils For Good— Mystery of Stolen Money Not Yet Cheared Up.

Lenoir, Jan. 21 .- The people Lenoir are very much exercised over the recent change of the C. & N. W. Rallway's schedule. And not only the people here, but numbers of traveling men are decrying the seemingly useless change and the great incon-venience it has brought. Passengers arriving in Chester from Columbia in the morning must now spend a day and night there to catch the train for Lenoir. And at Hickory the same thing happens if the Southern is a few minutes late. The train arrives about two hours earlier than it did, and the people fall to see the reason for the change. If there were several trains on the road they could con-ceive of conditions whereby a change might be necessary. But there is but one passenger train a day and it is, by the new schedule, made to miss ection with all others so that the daily papers reach nere from one to days late. Three issues of The Observer came yesterday.

If the change is for the purpose of helping to create the proper sentiment among the people, and especially the legislators who met at Raleigh to-day, it can be said that the people of Lenoir have never been in favor of a 2 1-4 cent rate. They prefer that the Legislature do something to abol-ish the detestable and abominable discrimination in freight rates. Some of the freight trains have been discontinued, and now to take off the passenger train between here and Hickory, as is spoken of, will simply kill the hen that laid the golden

Lenoir is certainly the best patron of the road. In fact the business which this section has given it hus been an indispensable factor in its derelopment and success. ... And not only that, but when the ratiroad rate bill was pending before the tast Legislature, the popular conductor of the C. & N. W. came to the people of Le-noir with a petition, asking the citizens to subscribe themselves as being in favor of exempting that road from the 2 1-4 cent rate, and nearly every citizen approached signed the petition. 


