CHARLOTTE IS BOOSTED. In Next Folder Sent Out From the Office of Secretary R. D. W. Connor, of the Teachers' Assembly, Some Attractive Advertisement of This City is Found.

A folder sent out announcing the meeting of the Teachers' Assembly in this city in June, bears attractive advertisement of Charlotte as well as sets forth the reasons for attendance on this interesting occasion. Four quotations from different persons, and embracing different reasons why the teachers should attend are these: For professional improvement, by Supt. J. F. Joyner; for esprit de corps, by Dr. George T. Winston, president of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of North Carolina; for organized help and action, by Prof. J. I. Foust, president of the State Normal and Industrial College for Women, at Greensboro; to share Charlotte's generous hospitality by The Observer.

On the back of the folder is found the names of places of interest in and around Charlotte, among them being the following: Monuments to the signers of the Mecklenburg Declaration, marking the battlefield of McIntyre's Farm and to Lieut. W. E. Shipp. Tablets marking historic spots as follows: Location of building in which the Declaration of Independence was signed, Lord Cornwallis' headquarters in 1780, location of the old Queen's Museum, Cook's Inn, where Washington stopped in 1781 and the spot on which Jefferson Davis was standing when he heard of the assassination of President Lincoln. Among the revolutionary battle-grounds are named McIntyre's Farm, Cowan's Ford and King's Mountain, and under the caption of "Other Historic Spots" are found Blesie's Mill, where Cornwallis ground corn for his army; birthplace of Andrew Jackson and the birthplace of James K. Polk. The names of the Carnegie Library, Federal Building, United States Army Office, Vance Park, Latta Park, Manufacturers' Club, Piedmont Park, Presbyterian College, Elizabeth College, Country Club, Colonial Club and the famous meadowlands of Mecklenburg are given under the title of "Other Interesting Places."
