A Venerable Barrister. Mr. R. T. Joyce, of Mount Airy, was in Charlotte Wednesday and gave an Observer man some facts concerning his father, Mr. A. H. Joyce, of Danbury, Stokes county, one of the oldest lawyers in the State, a noted wit, well known and very popular especially in northwestern North Carolina. He was born in Stokes and was 51 years of age last Sunday. He was licensed in 1849 and the first court he ever attended was at Germantown when it was the county seat. He located at Danbury in 1853 and attended the first court ever held at Winston. He was a member of the constitutional convention of 1861 and solicitor of his district from 1881 to '74. Mr. Joyce twelve years ago joined the Presbyterian Church. He has of course abandoned the practice of his profession, but continues in good health, a fact which his friends will be glad to learn.
