THE NEED OF A REVIVAL

REV. FRANK SILVER PREACHES. In Earnest and Powerful Sermon at Tryon Street Methodist Church.

Rev. Frank Silver, preaching at Tryon Street Methodist church yesterday morning, his theme being "The Need of a Revival." The theme was especially appropriate in view of the protracted meeting which Rev. Mr. Silver and the other Methodist ministers at the city will conduct in the Tryon Street church, beginning on March 29th, this to be a union meeting of the Methodist congregations of the city.

Before he began preaching Mr. Silver presented to the congregation the claim of the district parsonage debt, and asked those who were present to contribute the amount apportioned to this church, which was \$1,200. Mr. J. D. McCall assisted Mr. Silver in taking the subscriptions and about \$500 was secured.

The words of Mr. Silver's text are found in Habakkuk 3:2 and reads as follows: "O Lord, revive Thy work in the midst of the years, in the midst of the years make known; in wrath remember mercy."

"These words," said Mr. Silver, "contain three statements concerning a revival. 1. A revival defined. 2. A revival manifested. 3. The conditions of a revival.

"Habakkuk was conscious of the need of a revival, he realized the spiritual decline of the Church as it existed in his day. The history of the Church has been a course of revival and decline; note the decline of the Israelitish Church under Ahas and its revival under Hezekiah; the decline under Amos and Manasseh, and the revival under Josiah. And the same course is true of the Christian Church and has marked its history from its beginning. The Christian Church was born in the heat of a revival. At the Synod of Rome A. D. 502, the laity was prohibited any participation in the church and was denied the sacraments and the Bible, and for 500 years no bishop of Rome preached. These conditions marked the decline of the Church.

"Martin Luther revived the Church by emphasizing salvation by faith in his preaching. Wesley and Whitefield followed with the plea for the witness of the Spirit—a conscious salvation.

AMERICAN REVIVAL. In America, Jonathan Edwards, in the early years of the Church, preached as did Luther, emphasizing salvation by faith, and he was followed by Timothy Dwight and Dr. Finney, who like Wesley and Whitefield, emphasized the witness of the Spirit.

"It was in 1858 that James C. Lamphier, a layman, began a noon-day prayer meeting on Fulton street, New York, that resulted in a movement of laymen similar to that in our own time, this movement resulting in the winning of one million souls for the Church.

A REVIVAL NEEDED. "Of the eighty million people in the United States to-day, less than one-half are members of the churches. And while it is true that one million souls in the heathen world have been converted during the past one hundred years, it is true also that to-day there are two hundred million more heathens in the world than was the case at the beginning of the last century. This is accounted for on the ground that natural birth in heathen lands so far exceeds in number the converts which result from supernatural birth.

"Look now at the revival as defined in the text. Consider first what it is not. A revival does not consist in bringing unconverted people into the Church. And neither does it consist in bringing converted people into a church that is not spiritually alive. Such a course as this would be to place a living babe to the breast of a dead mother. A meeting that is called a revival does not simply result in the addition of members to the Church. It is not a miracle.

REVIVAL DEFINED. "A revival is defined in the text in terms of work, and to my mind this is very definite. In Charlotte during the past year there have been two revivals, one in the interest of young men and young women, through the agency of the Young Men's Christian Association and the Young Women's Christian Association and the other was a revival of interest in missions conducted through the 'Laymen's Missionary Movement.'

"The revival needed now is the revival which will result in the salvation of souls. There must be personal work of Christians before this revival will come. It must be preceded by a revival of personal work. There must be tact on the part of the workers and contact with the un-saved.

REVIVAL MANIFESTATIONS. "How shall this revival manifest itself? It must begin in the home, in the hearts of the parents. It must also make itself known in the Sabbath school. There must be evangelistic work in the Sabbath school. There are to-day only ten per cent.

"In addition to work that is done in the home and in the Sabbath school to bring about a revival, let the laymen and the women of the Church go to work. Let the city be divided into districts and let a census of the un-saved in the city be taken. Let this work be done as preparatory to the meeting which is to begin here the last Sabbath in this month. It is necessary that this large preparation be made.

NEED TO BE CHRIST-CENTRED. "And let us as individuals get rid of our own unrighteousness. Let us get rid of the pleasure seeking spirit for nothing so militates against soul saving as pleasure seeking. This is because the pleasure seeker is self-centred, and the man or the woman who is self-centred cannot be centred to others. What we need is to be Christ-centred, and only those who are Christ-centred are soul-savers."
