REVIVAL DEFINED. "A revival is defined in the text in terms of work, and to my mind this very definite. In Charlotte during the past year there have been two revivals, one in the interest of young men and young women, through the agency of the Young Men's Christian Association and the Young Woman's Christian Association and the other was a revival of interest in missions as conducted through the 'Laymen's

Missionary Movement.'
"The revival needed now is the revival which will result in the salvation of souls. There must be per-sonal work of Christians before this revival will come. It must be pre-ceded by a revival of personal work. There must be tact on the part of the workers and contact with the un-
