The merger of The North Carolina Medical Journal with The Charlotte Medical Journal, which has just been perfected will give this city one of the strongest and most ably edited publications of its kind issued from the press of the South.

The North Carolina Medical Journal has been edited for the past 10 years by Dr. W. H. Wakefield and has become thoroughly established in the part of the country.

For some time the question of the consolidation of these two publications has been under advisement, and the stockholders of the two concerns agreed a few days ago that the time was at hand for the merger.

The new journal, with its large field to cover, will become one of the foremost of its kind in the South.
