WHIPPING POST LEGAL

Case Against Overcor H. P. Dill is Dismissed by Court.

Greenville, S. C., May 13.—H. P. Dill, former changing overcor in this county, was today acquitted in the General Sessions Court of the charge of cruelly whipping a convict. The warrant for his arrest was sworn out by a former convict, who claimed that he was unmercifully whipped. The State took the ground that it was unlawful to whip convicts. Judge Prince charged it was legal to whip them as much as was necessary to carry out the sentence of the court as to hard labor. The case was hard fought. The jury was out only a short time. In the case had been decided against Dill it probably would have meant that the whipping post at the penitentiary would have been abolished.

OFFICER SHOT NEGRO

Bullet Takes Effect in Kidney and is Likely to Prove Fatal—Shooting Was in Self-Defense.
Marion, May 13.—A good deal of excitement was created in police circles yesterday morning by the report that a woman had been killed on the outskirts of town. Deputy Sheriff J. P. Ray received a telephone message to the effect that a woman was lying in the road dead. Accompanied by Chief of Police Finley Mr. Ray hurried to the scene and found that it was a mistake. They learned that a negro woman had been beaten by a negro man and that her cries had occasioned the report. As the officer approached the house where the man was, he saw them and escaped through the back door. Mr. Ray saw him and ran him into the woods. He got near enough to call on the negro to halt. As he did the negro turned and leveled his pistol to fire. Mr. Ray was too quick for him, however, and fired five times in rapid succession, emptying his revolver. The first shot passed through and knocked off the negro's hat.
