ON EVANGELISTIC WORK

PRESBYTERIANS URGE THIS

A Resolution is Presented and After Being Discussed is Adopted Calling For More Evangelistic Preaching by Ministers—Report of Judicial Committee is Made and Complaint of Texas Pastor is Made the Order For the Night Session—Spirited Contention Over Admission of Certain Papers, But Moderator Allows Them Admitted—Little Headway Made on the Case—Missions and Laymen's Movement Special to the Observer.

Greensboro, May 27.—The business of the General Assembly in every particular has been considered with the greatest deliberation and there has been no tendency to hurry. There is no fixed time as to the adjournment of any meeting of the Assembly, but judging from the custom for a number of years about nine days are occupied with the meeting and there is a looking forward to final adjournment of the meeting now in session on Friday of the present week. The devotional exercises this morning were of special interest because of the fact that Rev. Calvin N. Caldwell, D. D., of China, conducted them. Dr. Caldwell has done a very successful work as a missionary in China and he is held in very high esteem by the entire Assembly. The theme of his remarks this morning was the importance of the vision of the Lord to the Church and to the individual Christian.

JUDICIAL COMMITTEE. The first business to come before the Assembly was the hearing of a report of the judicial committee. The report recommended that in the complaint of the Presbytery of Eastern Texas against the Synod of Texas, on account of the action of Synod in the removal of Rev. F. E. Robbins as pastor of the church at Beaumont, Tex., that the case be heard and tried in open Assembly and that the defense be limited to one hour and thirty minutes each. An amendment to this recommendation of the committee regarding the time for the speeches was offered recommending that the time be limited to thirty minutes on each side, and the amendment was carried.

RESOLUTION ON EVANGELIZATION. A resolution was offered by Rev. A. A. Little calling attention to the importance of renewed and more active evangelistic work on the part of pastors and urging that they remember the supreme object of the preaching of the Gospel is the extension of the work of the Gospel among his members and in the hearts of the unconverted. This resolution was adopted by a large majority.

DUTY OF THE PASTOR. The other speaker on pastoral evangelization was Rev. George F. Robertson, pastor of Steele Creek church. He spoke of the supreme duty of the pastor to hold Christ continually before his people and before the unsaved in the community where his ministry is spent. No pastor could attain real success in his work, said Mr. Robertson, who neglected this all important work of being a true evangelist.

HEMPHILL IN CHARLOTTE. Brilliant South Carolina Editor Will to Hit With the Mecklenburgers. Yorkville, S. C., Enquirer.

There are very few newspaper readers in this State who are not cognizant of the long continued quarrel between Editor J. C. Hemphill of The News and Courier, and Editor J. E. Caldwell of The Charlotte Observer, over the authenticity of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, and the birthplace of Andrew Jackson. Mr. Hemphill ridicules the Mecklenburg Declaration as a myth, and cites reams of evidence to prove that Andrew Jackson was born in Lancaster; but Editor Caldwell, well knowing that he cannot yield and remain in Charlotte, insists stubbornly on both propositions.

THE TIME LIMITED. The action by which the Assembly early this morning limited the time allotted to the appellant and the appellee in the complaint of the Presbytery of Eastern Texas against the Synod of Texas to thirty minutes each was reconsidered and one hour was fixed as the limit of the time to be consumed in the representation of each side of this case. This complaint comes to the Assembly as a

appeal from the decision of the Synod of Texas in dissolving the pastoral relation existing between Rev. F. E. Robbins, D. D., and the church at Beaumont, Tex., this appeal having been taken by the Presbytery of Eastern Texas. The history of the case, stated briefly, is as follows: In this church of which Dr. Robbins was pastor, a part of the session of his church became dissatisfied with him as pastor and requested his resignation. The other faction in the session opposed his resignation, and he refused to resign. A congregational meeting was then called and Dr. Robbins was again requested to resign his pastorate, which he refused to do. Appeal was taken to Presbytery and Mr. Robbins' action was sustained. Appeal from the ruling of Presbytery was taken to Synod and Synod appointed a commission consisting of 14 members to consider this appeal and the vote stood as follows: Four not to sustain the appeal, and ten to sustain in part, whereupon the Synod of Texas decided that this vote was sufficient to dissolve the pastoral relation between Dr. Robbins and the church in Beaumont. Presbytery then appealed to the General Assembly against the decision of the Synod of Texas.

WILL REPRESENT PRESBYTERY. Judge L. G. Aldrich is the appellant and he will represent the Presbytery and the Synod of Texas. The report of the executive committee of foreign missions was taken from the docket and adopted. Ruling Elder D. E. Harrison submitted an amendment to come into the Church, in which he requested a de-licence of the Assembly on the subject of polygamy and urging that missionaries be instructed not to baptize and receive into the Church converts who would not first relinquish the practice of polygamy. The substitute was lost.

HOME AND SCHOOL REPORT. The report of the Assembly's Home and School was the next to be considered, and was adopted. One of the most important recommendations in the report was that \$25,000 should be given annually to this institution, which is located at Fredericksburg, Va. The wives and children of ministers who are left without the means of support are cared for in this home. The children of missionaries are also cared for here while separated from their parents during the years of their education.

It is probable that Elizabethtown, Ky., has the largest representation in the Assembly of any town in the bounds of the Church. Three ministers who are natives of that place, all of them sons of ruling elders, Revs. D. W. and H. H. Sweet and J. E. Park, are here. In addition to these Mr. H. A. Sommers, a ruling elder, and Rev. George F. Robertson, a former pastor of the church there, are here.

Much interest has been expressed by members of the Assembly in the published and unpublished correspondence in to-day's Observer relative to the call which will be extended to Rev. A. A. McGeachy, of Sherman, Tex., to become the pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church of Charlotte. Dr. McGeachy is easily one of the leading members of the Assembly, and his opinion whenever expressed has commanded close attention. This is situated, in fact, is not to be doubted, but the consecration of heart and purpose and the zeal which accompanies it is that which is most evident in a brief acquaintance with our pastor. In speaking with our correspondent to-day relative to the call to be extended to him from the Second church, Dr. McGeachy said that he would give his attention to consideration to the call. He said that almost his entire ministry had been spent in the West and that his whole heart is in his work in that part of the Church, and that should he return to his native State, it would be with the hope that the church of which he should become pastor here would come to be known as a church of large giving to the great cause of the home mission interests of the Church in the West.

At to-night's session the report of the committee on the Sabbath and family religion was presented, discussed and adopted.

The appeal of the Presbytery of Eastern Texas against the Synod of Texas came up as a special order. The record of the case was read. There was then a spirited contention over the admission of certain papers, but the moderator ordered that they be admitted. But little further headway was made when the Assembly took recess until 9 o'clock in the morning.
