EVANGELISTIC WORK

RESBYTERIANS URGE Resolution is Presented and After Being Discussed is Adopted Calling For More Evangelistic Preaching by Ministers—Report of Judicial Committee is Made and Complaint of Texas Pastor is Made the Order For the Night Session—Spirited Contention Over Admission of Certain Papers, But Ilodesator Allows Them Admitted—Little Headway Made on the Case—Missions and Laymen's Movement, pecial to The Observer.

Greensboro, May 27.—The business

Greensboro, May 27 .- The business of the General Assembly in every particular has been considered with the greatest deliberation and there has een no tendency to hurry. There is no fixed time as to the adjournment of any meeting of the Assembly, but judging from the custom for a number of years about nine days are occupled with the meeting and there is a looking forward to final adjournment of the meeting now in session on Friday of the present week. The devotional exercises this morning were of special interest because of the fact that Rev. Calvin N. Caldwell, D. D., of China, conducted them. Dr. Caldwell has done a very successful work as a missionary in China and he is held in very high esteem by the entire Assembly. The theme of his remarks this morning was the importance of the vision of the Lord to the Church and to the individual Christian

JUDICIAL COMMITTEE. The first business to come before the Assembly was the hearing of a report of the judicial committee. The report recommended that in the complaint of the Presbytery of Eastern Texas against the Synod of Texas, on account of the action of Synod in the removal of Rev. P. E. Robbins as pastor of the church at Beaumont, Tex., that the case be heard and tried in open Assembly and that the speeches of the complainant and the defense be limited to one hour and thirty minutes each. An amendment to this recommendation of the committee regarding the time for the speeches was offered recommending that the time be limited to thirty minutes on each side, and the amend-ment carried.

The report of the judicial committes with reference to the complaint against the Synod of Texas on account of the action of the Synod in the transfer of certain church property be heard before a commission and tried by the same, the moderator to appoint the commission. He appointed this commission, consisting of twenty-seven members, part of the humber being ministers and part be-

ing elders.

There was an intermission of a few minutes just before 11 o'clock and at that hour the sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed. Rev. R. F. Campbell, of Asheville, and Rev. W. M. Anderson, D. D., of Nashville, Tenn., were in charge of this service. This service was largely attended and was one that will long be remembered on account of its spirituality and impressiveness. RESOLUTION ON EVANGELIZA-

A resolution was offered by Rev.

A. Little calling attention to the importance of renewed and more acdive evangelistic work on the part of pastors and urging that they remem-ber the supreme object of the preach-er and the pastor is the extension of the work of the Gospel among his members and in the hearts of the unsaved so that they will accept Christ, This resolution called forth one of the most interesting series of speeches the most interesting series of speeches that has been made during the Assembly and which held the close attention of the entire pody. The first speaker was Rev. A. A. McGeachy, who is acknowledged as one of the most successful of the pastors in the West. He spoke of his intense interest in seeing his membership rise to a higher plane of spirituality and Christian activity and of his desire Christian activity and of his desire for his ministry both in the pulpit and in the homes where he visits to be the means of winning the unsaved

to Christ.

Rev. W. M. Anderson, of Nashville,
Tenn., spoke along the same line and told of experiences in his life as pastor of the First Presbyterian church in Nashville, where just a little spe-cial effort on the part of the pastor had been the means of winning numbers of young people to the Church who before the special effort was made were not interested in the Church nor in their own personal salvation. He said in this connection that when the pastor falls to be an evangelist he has failed in one of his nost important duties

DUTY OF THE PASTOR.

The other speaker on pastoral evangelization was Rev. George F. Robertson, pastor of Steele Creek church. He spoke of the supreme duty of the pastor to hold Christ continually before his people and before the unsaved in the community where his ministry is spent. No pastor could attain real success in his work, said Mr. Robertson, who neglected this all important work of being a true evangelist.




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
