

TORNADO KILLS SIX.

Tornado in Minnesota Kills Six Peo-ple and Injures Twenty-Five Oth-ers—Train Blown From Track and Much Property Destroyed. Fifteen freight cars were blown off the track as was also a passenger coach containing seventeen people. All were injured but it has been impos-sible to learn their names or the ex-tent of the injuries. The two churches which were de-stroyed are the Norwegian Lutheran and the Episcopal. Telegraph lines were blown down but as soon as possible, news of the disaster was sent to neighboring towns. Relief trains were run from Graceville, Ortonville and Montevideo. Mrs. Vandemar is also among the dead, making the total seven.






