

EXAMINATIONS UNDER WAY

DENTISTS MEET WEDNESDAY

Forty-Two Young Men Standing Examinations For License to Practice Dentistry in North Carolina—The Personnel of the Examining Board and the Officers of the Dental Association—First Session Will Be Held Wednesday Night at 8:30 O'clock—A Programme of Wide Range of Technical and General Subjects Will Be Discussed.

Beginning at 8:30 o'clock yesterday morning in the aedernian chamber of the city hall, forty-two young men armed with pen and ink and other utensils of intellectual warfare attacked a formidable lot of questions designed, not for their torture with malice aforethought, but out of regard for the welfare and religion of the people of the State, to determine whether or not they are qualified to do dental work, according to the standard of the profession. TROOPS TO MEXICAN BORDER

President Roosevelt Orders Troops to Mexican Border to Assist the Civil Authorities in Preserving Order—General Myers Will Command the Troops. Washington, June 29.—By direction of President Roosevelt, Secretary of War Taft has issued orders to the commanding general of the Department of Texas, at San Antonio, to send a sufficient number of troops to Del Rio, El Paso, and other points in Texas, to aid the civil authorities in preserving order. This action was decided upon as a result of the request from the Mexican government that the United States do its utmost to prevent any violation of the neutrality laws. The request of the Mexican government was referred to the Attorney General by the State Department and the Governor of Texas in the meantime was asked to aid in compelling obedience to the law. The order of the President sending troops to the border is understood to have been made upon the recommendation of the Attorney General. Brigadier General A. L. Myer, in command of the Department of Texas, is authorized to ascertain the number of troops necessary at Del Rio and also to send troops to any other points along the Mexico-Texas border if found advisable. The Federal troops will act under the directions of the United States marshal and the United States district attorney. The troops' presence will also do much to prevent any outbreaks within United States territory and will be of material assistance in the event that revolutionists should cross the border. Del Rio is directly opposite Las Vacas, Mex., where the principal disturbances have occurred.

MAJOR ANDREWS DROPS DEAD.

Heart Disease Removes a Fine Old Southern Gentleman—Life Spent in Instructing the Youth of the State. Special to The Observer. Monroe, June 29.—Major Lorenzo Dow Andrews, a Confederate soldier dropped dead of heart disease in the garden of his residence at 8 o'clock to-night. He was a native of Randolph county, and after the war resided for a few years on his farm in Montgomery county. He came to Monroe 23 years ago from Norwood, Stanly county, where he had conducted a school and organized the Monroe High School, in which he taught until a few years ago, when he retired on account of advancing age. Major Andrews leaves a widow, two sons and four daughters. He had been a teacher since early manhood and was recognized as of great ability in his profession. He was 73 years old and a life-long member of the Methodist Church. He was a gentleman of the old school, full of honor and courtesy, and his passing away is felt as a personal loss to every one in Monroe.
