

As yet tobaccoo is not coming in freely and there have been no large breaks this season, Monthy primings have been sold on the warehouse floors, and it will be ten days before the best grades are sold and prices reported.

### WILL ABOLISH CHAINGANG.

Pasquotank County Finds the Con-vict System of Labor Unprofitable. Special to The Observer.

Elizabeth City, Sept. 11.-The grand jury has recommended that the chaingang in this county be abolished the first of the coming year and the serious question troubling the county commissioners has been what disposition to make of the convicts whose terms shall not have expired before the 1st of January. However, a solution of the problem may be in sight now, as a movement is on foot among some of Currituck county's progressive citizens to lease the conricts from this county. The citizens of Currituck are hampered very much by bad roads and they have been trying to arrive at some plan concerning the county roads, some of which are in a miserable condition and upon which travel is heavy, and it is thought that the chaingang system will be adopted. It is claimed that the convicts have

been a burden to the county and that the class of work done on the roads was not satisfactory or of sufficient permanency to continue the system.


