Infant Dies of Membranous Croup. Special to The Observer.

Boone, Sept. 14.—Daniel Disco, the little 2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Dougherty, died Friday at 3 p. m. of membranous croup. Funeral services over the remains were held Saturday from the family residence at 2 o'clock by Rev. J. P. Davis, pastor of the Baptist church. The interment was in the Boone Cemetery.

Salisbury, Sept. 13.—Mrs. Margaret Dorton, aged 76, died this morning at 2:30 o'clock at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Samuel Horton, on South Church street, from a complication of diseases. The deceased leaves four sons and five daughters, among them being Mrs. Samuel Horton, of this city, and Mrs. J. C. Stanell, of Mill Bridge, this county, and Mr. Ed Dorton, a salesman with Smoot Bros. & Rogers, this city, and Mr. Dexter Dorton, of Spencer. She also leaves a large number of relatives in this and Cabarrus county. The remains will be taken to Rogers' M. E. Church in No. 10 township, Cabarrus county, to-morrow morning for burial, her old home being in that neighborhood.

Miss Lucile Devereaux, of Statesville. Correspondence of The Observer.

Statesville, Sept. 13.—A sad death, and one which will be mourned by many young people of the town, occurred yesterday morning at 2:20 o'clock, when Miss Lucile Devereaux, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Devereaux, passed into the Great Beyond. Miss Devereaux had been ill about seven weeks with typhoid fever and other diseases and it had been realized by the attending physicians for some days that she could not live. One week after she became ill she was taken to the Billingsley Hospital where everything possible was done in an effort to save her life. Brief burial services were conducted at the grave this morning at 10 o'clock by the family pastor, Rev. C. A. Jenkins, of the First Baptist church, and the body was laid to rest in a mound covered with many floral tributes. A large number of friends gathered in the pretty Oakwood Cemetery to pay their last respects to the popular young woman.

Miss Devereaux was 20 years old. She moved here with her parents and brothers from Salisbury some years ago, and by her sweet disposition had won many warm friends among the young people of the town. She was a favorite with her parents, being the only daughter at home, and the father, who suffered a nervous breakdown a few days ago, and the mother are both almost prostrated with grief. Besides her parents Miss Devereaux is survived by one sister and three brothers, viz: Mrs. A. L. McNell, of Salisbury; Mr. E. S. Devereaux, of Savannah, Ga.; Mr. Julian Devereaux, who is in the United States army, and Mr. Russell Devereaux, who lives at home. All had been here at her bedside except Mr. Julian Devereaux, who was unable to come. Other relatives who arrived during the past few days are two aunts, Mrs. W. E. Peregrine, of Baltimore, and Mrs. E. J. Carter, of Washington City. Miss Devereaux spent much time in Baltimore with Mrs. Peregrine and the latter was much attached to her.

Biggest Sun Spot Affects the Earth.

Pittsburg, Pa., Dispatch, 12th. Attracted by probably the most remarkable aurora borealis ever witnessed in this section of the country, Dr. John A. Brashear, the astronomer, last night made a measurement of an immense sun spot he had just photographed. This spot covers 2,250,000,000 square miles of the surface of the sun, and has a temperature estimated at 60,000 degrees above zero. The aurora borealis flashed in brilliant shafts from the west to the north. The display lasted nearly six hours. Dr. Brashear believes there is a close connection between the aurora borealis and sun spots. "I expect we shall hear of magnetic disturbances due to the sun spots," said Dr. Brashear.
