MR. STEWART APOLOGETIC.

Begs Recorder Smith's Pardon for Famous Affidavit Which He Presented Some Mornings Ago.

The city court ran out of its ordinary channel yesterday morning when Attorney Plummer Stewart, before the docket was started upon, arose with apologetic mien and asked Recorder Smith's pardon for any in-sults or direct reflections upon the court which might have been found in the rather famous affidavit which he presented some mornings ago in behalf of a client, Will Medlin.

The statement of Mr. Stewart yesterday was as follows: "Your Honor: Some time ago in this court I read a paper on behalf of my client, Will Medlin, praying for a removal of his case. You will recall, your honor, that the same was withdrawn almost immediately after being read, but feeling that the course taken in the matter might be construed by some as an attempt to treat the court discourteously and, sincerely wishing to remove any and all doubt from the mind of your honor as to the possibility of such intention, I take this, the first opportunity since presenting the paper, to publicly apologize to your honor.

"I am persuaded that the stability of government and the safety of society depends largely upon the respect of the people for the courts.

"As a citizen, I wish to tender to your honor due apology on behalf of my client, Will Medlin, for executing the paper, and also for myself for reading same to the court, which I hope your honor will accept in the spirit tendered."
