And all Traders' Land druggists selling such spirituous, vinous or mait liquors or intoxicating bitters for sickness, upon the written prescriptions of legally qualified physiclans, shall conform to and be subject to all the general laws of the State of North Carolina now in force, or that may hereafter be enacted, applicable gists in this State, except as in and by
