War Department Issues List of the Successful Competitors in Fort Leavenworth Examination—Two North Carolinians Among the Lucky Young Men.

Washington, Sept. 28 .- The War Department to-day made public the names of 91 persons appointed sec ond lieutenants from civil life as the result of the competitive examination at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, in July, The unusually large number is due partly to the increase in the coast artillery corps authorized by Congress and partly to the fact that the graduating class at West Point in June did not contain as many members as is frequently the case.
