BIBLE STUDY BY LAYMEN. Special Course Being Arranged For Charlotte During First Week in December—The Purpose and Scope of the Movement—Those Actively Interested. A meeting for Bible study will be held in this city the first week in December. In character it will be interdenominational. In organization it is a movement on the part of laymen of the various churches. In scope and purpose it aims solely to secure able and true expositors of the Bible to "rightly divide the word of truth," touching only on the great fundamentals upon which the mass of evangelists and laymen are all agreed; also to arouse interest on the part of all who attend to study the Bible for themselves. A number of laymen have been planning for such a meeting for a year or longer, in the hope that it may become an annual event. They have finally put the matter before representative men of all denominations and have been endorsed in the effort to launch the Bible study conference. In searching for a place to hold the conference, the new pastor of the Second Presbyterian church and his session have kindly and cordially invited the Bible conference to be held in that church. The exact date is from November 29th to December 5th—Sunday to Sunday. Two of the speakers for the first meeting will be Rev. Dr. Frederick W. Parr, of Philadelphia, and Rev. Dr. W. R. Dobyns, of St. Joseph, Mo. If others are added they will be announced later. The two selected are among the ablest Bible teachers of the country. Both are men of deep piety, natural gifts and magnetic presence, besides being thoroughly furnished in the Scriptures.
