REFUSE TO FURNISH GAS.

Citizens Allege That 4 C's Refuse to

Legal proceedings are threatened against the Charlotte Consolidated Construction Company by quite a number of leading citizens, some of them members of the beard of aldermen, because of an alleged refusat to furnish gas to consumers of electricity from the plants of the Southern Power Company, a competing concern. While the controversy remains now in an embryonic state.

nains now in an embryonic state, there is promise that it will eventuate into an interesting fight.

The main contention of the 4 Cs is that it has been found an unsatisfactory and unprefitable practice to "back up" the electric lighting of the Southern Power Company and for this reason its managers came to the conreason its managers came to the conclusion that they would allow gas only to subscribers for their own electricity. As the same time they agreed to furnish gas to customers of the competing company in case the right was reserved to discontinue service. was reserved to discontinue service when it was found to be unprofitable. A number of citizens who are just finishing new residences and have fixtures are greatly disappointed and at a loss to know what step to take in the matter. They have contracted for electricity with the Southern Power Company, but also want gas for illuminating

illuminating purposes as well, the double lighting arrangement being essential in the emergency that the essential in the emergency that the electric current goes off.

No definite steps have been taken by the angered ones toward securing a relief, but it is known as a certainty that attorneys have been consulted and the matter discussed. Others said they would take it to the board of aldernien and ask for such rights as they were entitled to at the hands of a public service corporation.


