THE TOURIST SEASON.

Will Begin a Week Earlier and Out-look is For Greater Business For the Railroads.

The annual exodus from the North of visitors seeking warmer climes win begin a week earlier this winter, the regular runs both by the Seaboard and the Atlantic Coast Line beginand the Atlantic Coast Line begin-ning the first week in January. The Southern has made as yet no an-nouncement of its plans for handling the tourist trade over its line. The outlook for a heavy business is considered encouraging and will be at least as good as any past season, and very probably better.

The Florida Limited which is run

by the Seaboard will consist exclusively of Pullman cars, electrically lighted throughout. As features there will be a club car and an observation car. All meals en route will be served in the Pullman dining car. The train will be made up of a com-posite club car with baggage compartment, a dining car, two 12-section drawing room sleepers, one compartment car and one compartment ob-

servation car. Under the schedule to be used this year two hours will be gained in the running time between New York and the Florida points. The entire train will be operated solid between New York and St. Augustine, while one of the sleepers will be sent through to Palm Beach, another to Miami and a third to Knight's Key. The run-ning of the sleepers beyond St. Augustine is a new feature. The first southbound train will leave New York January 4th, reaching Savannah on the 5th. The first northbound car

will leave on the 6th.

The Atlantic Coast Line train known as the New York and Florida Special will also be operated on faster time this season than before, there being a gain of 25 minutes over the old running time. The trains will be made up of the finest Pullman cars put out, having every convenience to make life on them while traveling a pleasure. The time in which the Savannah is 22 hours and 10 minutes. This line will also introduce as new feature the operation of sleepers on through to Miami and Knight's Key, making it possible to have through sleeper accommodations to these points, something never before enjoyed. These extended services for the east coast railways will reach farther south than any other sleeping car service in the United States.
