Boston, Jan. 3 .- It is anticipated that the coming session of the Legislatures of five New England States, Maine, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Massachusetts and Connecticut will be particularly interesting this year as the incoming Governors in each lation in the matter of forestry, fishislatures will convene during the coming week, and five new Governors will be inaugurated.

NORTH STATE'S NEW POETESS.

Her Near-Greatness, But Remains Wedded to Its Idol. New York Sun.

October 25th, 1774, fifty-one women tea drinkers met at the house of Mrs. Elizabeth King, and after many herolo speeches resolved to prefer lib-erty to taxed tes; and the taboo wasn't taken off until the Revolution was over. According to The Chariotte Observer, whose motives in the matter are not beyond suspicion, since if memorial tablet "was placed in a wall of the rotunda of the capitol" October 25th, 1908, "showing a large tea urn, the house where the tea party was held, etc.," and at a tea party a poem was read, a part of which The Observer now publishes. It is sus-picious, to say the least, that this poem did not appear until after we had placed the bard of Cappahoosic too high for rivalry. For the bene-fit of atudents we republish some passages of this lay, reserving our opinion as to its origin, date and authenticity. Accepting it for what it pre-tends to be, compared with the known works of Andrews it is but the squash pipe reed to the concert of the spheres:
