COTTON MARKET.

New York, Jan. 4.—The cotton market reacted after an early advance and settled quiet during the afternoon with the close steady, not unchanged to 4 points lower. Sales for the day were estimated at 200,000 bales.

The market opened steady at an advance of 4 to 5 points and during the early session sold 5 to 10 points net higher in response to higher cables.

There was a good deal of realizing at the advance, however, and as there seemed to be very little broadening of demand prices soon developed a reactionary tendency which was probably promoted by bearish week-end figures and large estimates for to-morrow's receipts at leading points.

A couple of private ginning reports issued during the day each pointed to about 12,400,000 bales ginned to January 1st, and while this reflected a considerable falling off as compared with the previous period the figures seemed fully as large as expected.
