THE DEATH RECORD.

LaFayette Johnson, of Haw River. Special to The Observer. Burlington, Jan. 9.—Mr. LaFayette Johnson died suddenly at his home in Haw River last night. He was about 35 years of age and leaves a family.

Ex-Sheriff E. W. Taylor, of Brunswick. Correspondence of The Observer. Wilmington, Jan. 8.—News reached the city at an early hour this morning of the death of ex-Sheriff E. W. Taylor, of Brunswick county, which occurred at 10:45 o'clock last night at his home at Wilmington. Mr. Taylor celebrated his 73rd birthday with his daughter, Mrs. D. H. Johnson, of Town Creek, near his home, and returning that evening he complained of a slight attack of indigestion, taking some medicine to relieve himself and retiring about 9 o'clock that night. Before morning he suffered an attack of something like apoplexy, relapsing into unconsciousness, from which he never recovered. Mr. Taylor was born in Onslow county but removed to Brunswick about 1845 and had resided in the Town Creek section ever since. He was a man of the highest integrity, positive in his life and character but withal kindly and genial in his bearing toward his fellow man.

He was first married to Miss Jane Russell, a member of the earlier families of the Cape Fear, and she preceded him to the grave in 1870, leaving two surviving but one child as the result of that union, Mrs. J. E. Taylor, of Wilmington, and his second wife was Miss Sarah E. Mercer, a daughter of Mrs. A. J. Mercer, now of this city and she passed away in 1888. From this union five children, the only remaining members of the immediate family, now survive. They are: Representative C. Ed Taylor, of Southport; Mrs. John E. Gill, of Henderson; J. Mercer Taylor, of Wilmington; Edwin Taylor, of Wilmington; and Mrs. D. R. Johnson, of Wilmington. In 1889 Mr. Taylor married a third time, his wife being Miss Sophia J. Mercer, a sister of his second wife, and she passed away in 1904, leaving no children being left as the result of that union.

Mr. Taylor was one of the first county commissioners of Brunswick under the constitution of 1868, which had largely to do with the re-organization of the affairs of government under the new system, and was elected a member of the constitutional convention of 1875. He was sheriff and treasurer of the county for four years, until about 1885, after which he served a short time as collector of internal revenue in Wilmington. He was a member of the Chesapeake Lodge No. 42, A. F. & A. M., of Southport, and for many years had been a consistent and faithful member and officer of Zion M. E. church, of Town Creek, from which the funeral service was held at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The interment was in the family burying ground.
