THE COTTON CROP.

Census Bureau Reports a Total of 12,470,226 Bales Ginned Up to January 1st—Nearly Three Million Bales Ahead of 1907-North Carolina Furnished 646,731 Bales.

Washington, Jan. 9.—The census bureau to-day reported 12,470,228. running bales of cotton ginned from the growth of 1908, to January 1st last, against 9,951,505 a year ago, and 27,386 ginneries operated against 27,-276 a year ago. The percentage of the whole crop ginned to January 1st 38 per cent. for 1909, and 90.4 for 1908.

The report includes 231,821 round bales, and 86,018 Sea Island bales for 1909. It counts round bales as half bales and excludes linters. The cotton ginned to January 1st, 1907, and 906, was 11,741,039 and 9,725,426 pales, respectively. The total crop bales, respectively. of 1907 was \$1,957,922, of which 92.7 per cent. was ginned to January 1st. crops of 1906 and 1997 were 12,-983,201 and 10,495,195, respectively. The running bales ginned by States ginned to January 1st, last, and gin-

neries, respectively, follow: Alabama, 1,304,324 and 3,467. Arkansas, 911,123 and 2,118; Florida, 66,868 and 255; Georgia, 1,933,956 and 4,453; Kansas, Kentucky and New Mexico, 1,672 and 6 ginneries; Louisiana, 456,188 and 1,691; Mississippi, 1,518,707 and 3,465; Missouri, 53,929 and 78; North Carolina, 645,731 and 2,741; Oklahoma, 534,449 and 986; South Carolina, 1,176,743 and 3,219; Tennessee, 217,343 and 646; Texas, 3,486,510 and 4,147; Vir-

ginia, 12,143 and 114. There were 179,694 round bales and 73,425 Sea Island bales for 1908, and 255,566 round bales and 54.275 Sea Island bales for 1907.

The distribution of Sea Island cotton for 1909 follows: Florida, 32,793; Georgia, 41,037; South Carolina, 12,181. Corrected statisfics of the quantity of cotton ginned to December 13th, last, are 11,904,289 bales.
