NAVAL STORES CONTROVERSY.

Proposal For Federal Inspection Likely to Give Congress Lots of Trouble—State Inspection Said to Be Ineffective—Great Fight Being Made on the Hill.

Washington, Jan. 30.—With a determination to win manifested by both advocates and opponents, the proposal for a Federal inspection of naval stores, designed to enter into interstate commerce, is proving to be a very perplexing problem for Congress. The measure affects turpentine and rosin especially.

While the advocates are fighting to have the Tallafero-Sparkman bill enacted into law at this session, the opponents are not only attempting to defeat such action by this Congress, but to kill the entire proposition for all time.

In the arguments that have been presented to the respective committees of the Senate and House, it has been said that the Federal inspection of turpentine and rosin is required to save the industry, and to protect the consumer from frauds that cannot be, or are not, prevented by such State inspections as exist.

Both bills were introduced by Florida men and the arguments for the bill have been presented largely by persons living in Florida. It is therefore charged by the opposition that the fight is largely one between the States of Florida and Georgia.

It is argued that even if a State law was effective in preventing adulteration of turpentine and the grading up of rosin while within the State, the possibilities of fraud while the products are in interstate transportation, due to the fact that 95 per cent, consumed beyond the South, are such that relief must be sought.

Besides the frauds said to be practiced, it is urged that under existing conditions the American Naval Stores company, with headquarters at Savannah, Ga. controls the market, and therefore that independent producers are being driven out of the field. Hope is entertained, the advocates said, that a Federal inspection would make the market more equal.

The opponents of the bill reply that the cry of "trust" is made merely to strike a blow at Savannah, because under the proposed law, the Florida product that is now sent to the port of Savannah, would be sent to Florida ports, because it would thus avoid becoming subject to interstate commerce laws and regulations.

ALDERMEN IN SESSION.

The entire proposition under the ruling of Chairman McDowell, as announced elsewhere to-day, will finally go back to the board and it was considered important that the prevailing opinion be ascertained as early as possible.

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
