

LEMP DIVORCE CASE BEGINS.

Fashionable St. Louis Audience Gathers For the First Session—Mrs. Lemp Tells of the Horrible Treatment she Received at the Hands of Her Husband—Son's Education Caused the Separation.

St. Louis, Feb. 8.—The divorce suits which Lillian H. Lemp and her husband, William J. Lemp, Jr., filed against each other came to trial in the St. Louis Circuit Court today before Judge Hiltz. The case has attracted wide attention. The trial before the proceeding began at the audience of fashionable attired and well-to-do women was on hand.

The suit for divorce, for alimony and for custody of William J. Lemp, III, was filed by Mrs. Lemp. She immediately thereafter Mr. Lemp filed a cross bill also asking for alimony and custody of the child.

Mrs. Lemp says her husband is worth \$150,000 and has an income of \$10,000 a year, and she asks enough to support herself and her child comfortably.

Mrs. Lemp told her husband that she had been deceived by her husband. She declared he had deceived her when she was a girl.

Mrs. Lemp said her husband had taught her to smoke cigarettes. The religious education of the child was one of the main causes of the divorce, according to Mrs. Lemp. She asserted she had had the child baptized in the Roman Catholic Church, despite the father's wish to the contrary.

Mrs. Lemp said she had signed an antenuptial contract by which she agreed to surrender all rights of religious instruction of any child born of the marriage until it was years of age.

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"INSURGENTS" ARE READY.
