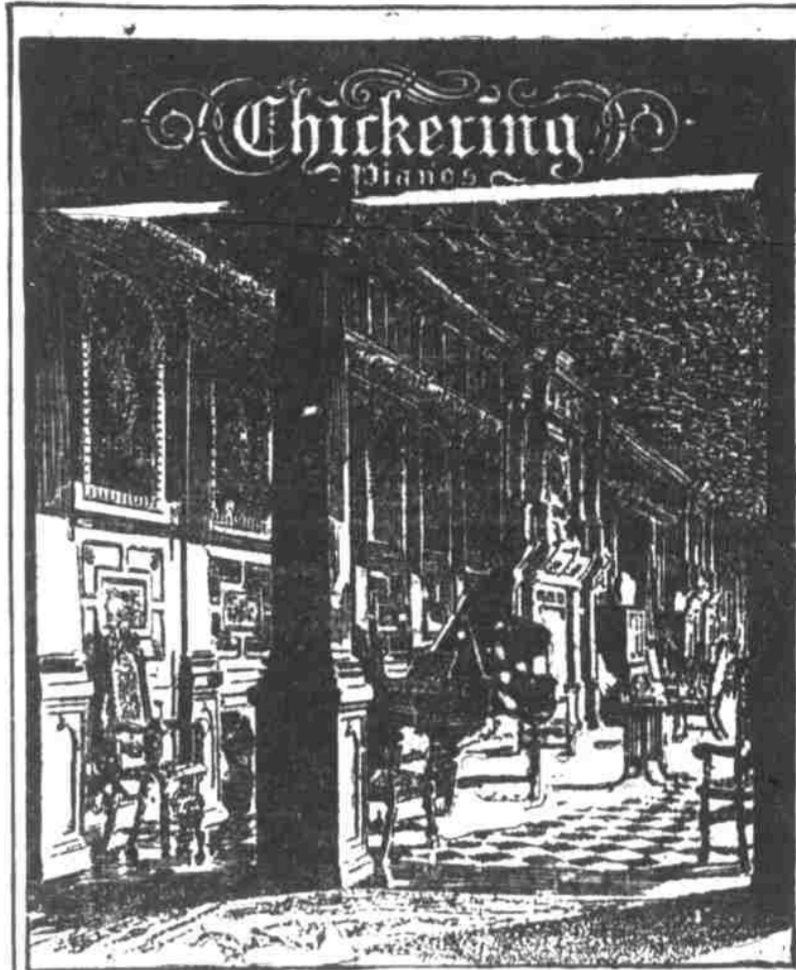

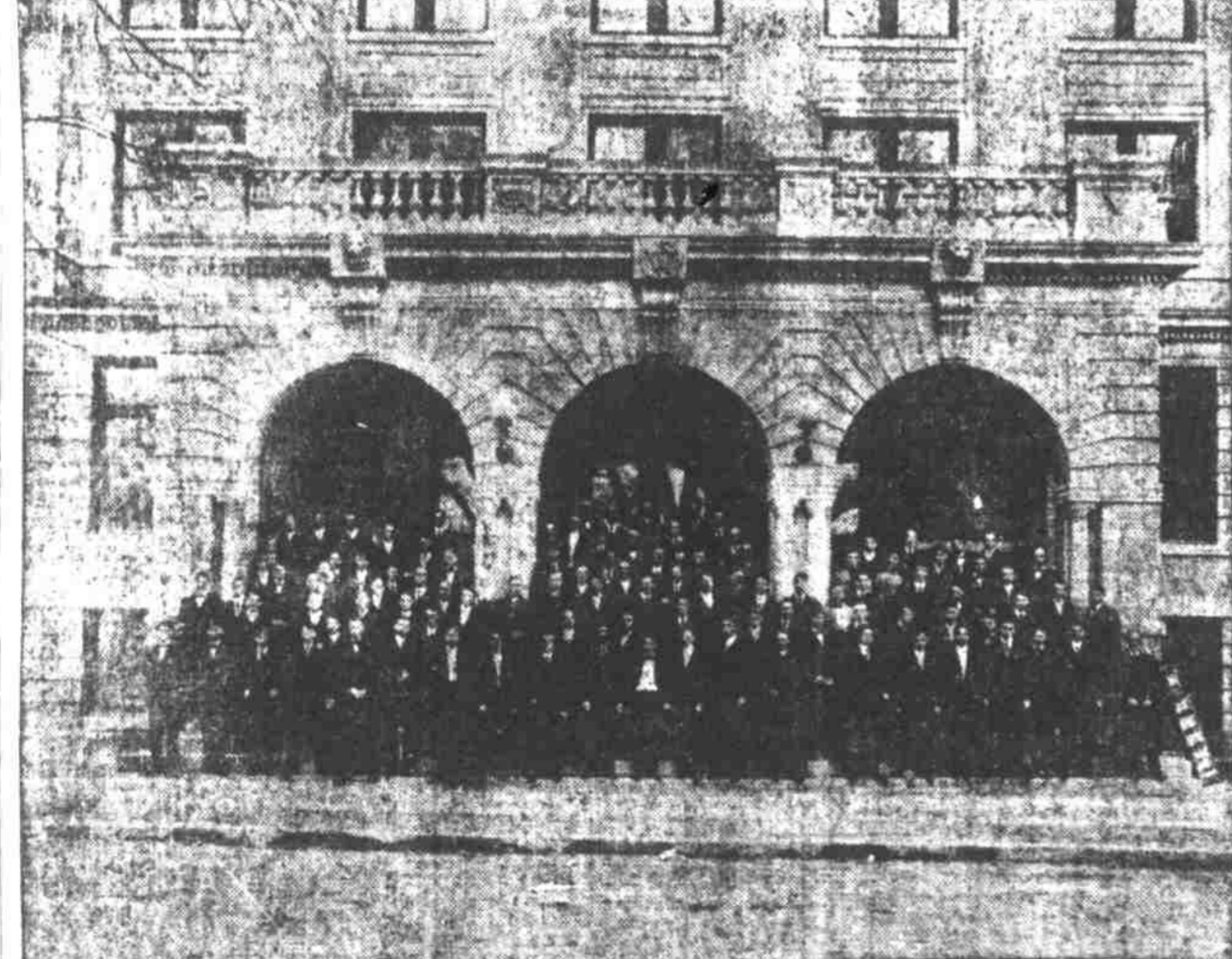

At this time resolutions were brought before the convention from Anderson, Greenville and Greenville asking the consideration for the next meeting of the association. Mr. Stewart, mayor of Anderson, S. C., was the first who asked permission of the chairman to address the body. Mr. Stewart, in a few thoughtful remarks, invited the convention to meet in Anderson. He said: "I come first, in the interest of my town as the next meeting place. The next invitation to the convention was that from Greenville, S. C. A letter was read from the chamber of commerce of that city, urging the convention to select Greenville for the next meeting place. As the work of selecting a meeting place for the convention is left entirely in the hands of the business committee, no action was taken on the resolutions presented by the different cities.

DE. FISHER LAST NIGHT. The feature of last night with the convention was the address by Dr. George J. Fisher, of New York, on "Physical Efficiency Necessary in the Making of Better Men." Without the slightest attempt at oratorical or dramatic effect, but speaking with directness and earnestness, Dr. Fisher addressed an audience of men and women which taxed the capacity of Hanna Hall. That, of course, isn't saying so very much for the size of the crowd, but it was an intelligent, interested audience, as shown by the attention it paid the speaker and the questions fired at him at the close of his remarks.
