HIGH SCHOOL PLAN LOST.

Board of School Commissioners Decides Adversely on Proposal to Re-model Building Corner of Broad and Ninth for a High School. By the vote of 6 to 4 the board of school commissioners, in special meeting assembled last night, went on record against the remodeling which would amount to the building of a high school on the property of the board in the first ward, corner Broad and Ninth.

That primary schools are too badly needed in several places—Severville, Myers Park, North Charlotte and a negro school in the third ward for instance—to make advisable the expenditure of money for a high school building which was not an absolute necessity seemed to be the idea which gave to the opponents of the measure the victory. Mr. J. Hirsinger sent a letter in which he took the position that the commissioners could not legally erect a building, as that is the prerogative of the aldermen.

There were among the members of the board some who warmly favored the building of the school and these were somewhat disappointed at what seemed like a turning about face. The body, as stated, had already given sanction to the idea in a way by its previous action, but on reconsideration and the submission of estimates, some changed their minds. The building planned was to contain eight rooms, four on the first floor and four on the second, 66 by 68 feet in dimensions.
