MR. WETHERILL'S DEATH.

Philadelphia North American Comments on Passing of Former Charlotte Resident as One Causing Much Sorrow. The death of Mr. Thomas Wetherill, who formerly lived in this city for some years, which has already been mentioned in this paper, occurred at Saratoga Lake, N. Y. The North American, of Philadelphia, which prints his photograph, says the following about Mr. Wetherill: "In leading business and social circles in this city the news came with a great shock yesterday of the death of Thomas Wetherill, paint manufacturer, at Saratoga Lake, N. Y., on Saturday. Mr. Wetherill was vice president of the George D. Wetherill Company, incorporated, of this city. Mr. Wetherill was widely known in the commercial circles of this State as one of the most vigorous of business men. He was a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, and a member of the Art Club, the Bachelor's Edge Club and many other organizations."
