REIS' GOOD WORK STOPPED THE RUNS

Brazelle Was Wild in Early Inning and Errors by McPherson, a New Man, Gave the Champions a Great Lead—Charlotte Hit Four Runs in the Six Off Ridgeway.

Greensboro, May 15.—By piling up four runs on Brazelle in the first inning and adding three more in the fourth on a rank error of McPherson, who let McKevitt's grounder get through him when the bases were full, the Champions clinched to-day's game, winning from Charlotte by a score of 7 to 4.

Charlotte did not get a hit until the sixth when they jumped on Ridgeway for two singles, a double and a triple which, with Walsh's error, netted the visitors their only four runs. After this Ridgeway settled down and yielded no more hits.

Barring the sixth inning his pitching was the feature of a well-played exhibition. Brazelle was wild and ineffective, giving three bases on balls, hitting Bentley and allowing six hits in the three and two-thirds innings that he pitched. Reis, who relieved him, struck out Bentley and retired the side and during the rest of the time allowed only one single by Lynch, who was caught trying to steal second. His pitching was superb.

Although the locals made three errors, only one was costly and the Champions did clock-like work throughout.

Anthony's base-running is worthy of special mention, while the double play pulled off by Linneborn, Brennan and Humphrey was a pretty piece of work.

YALE WON DUAL MEET

Sons of Eli Defeated Harvard With East-Three Dual Records Were Broken. New Haven, Conn., May 15.—Yale beat Harvard in the international dual games this afternoon. The total was: Yale, 55 1-5; Harvard, 48 4-5.

Three dual records were broken. In the 2-mile event, H. Jaques, of Harvard, made the distance in 97 minutes, 45 4-5 seconds, which was 54 5-5 seconds under the record of H. H. Stone, Harvard, three years ago. Cooney, Yale, tossed the hammer 196 feet, 10 inches, 6 feet, 1 inch further than Shelvin put it in 1904.

In the 220-yard dash, Foster, of Harvard, made the distance in 21 2-5 seconds, one-fifth of a second better than Schick, of Harvard, did seven years ago. Howe, Yale, in the high hurdles, ran two-fifths of a second better than F. B. Fox in 1890, but unfortunately in making the ninth flight, he tipped over a hurdle and it was later determined that the record could not stand.

The broad jump was won by Kilpatrick by beating out Little, of Harvard, by a single inch.

Travis Wins Finals. Washington, May 15.—With President Taft and Vice President Sherman forming the centres of a distinguished gallery, Walter J. Travis, of Garden City, former amateur golf champion of the United States, today defeated Allan Lard, of Chevy Chase, in the finals for the first prize of the spring open golf tournament at the Chevy Chase Club. At the end of the 36 holes, Travis was 19 up.
