

olon, won the international Marathon derby to-day against a field of eight of the world's best long-distance run-The champion's time was 2 nours, 48 minutes and 11 1-5 seconds. St. Yves led the race to-day until the fifteenth mile was passed, when he was forced to drop out of the race on account of a blistered foot. St. Yves was 50 seconds ahead of Svanberg. The Swede passed him in a sprint and St. Yves fell. It looked as though Svanberg had tripped the Frenchman, but St. Yves explained after he had limped off the track that he could not have run any further any Way.

Johnny Hayes finished second in 2:52:67 2-5. Fred Appleby, an Englishman, finished third in 3:01:07 2-5 After the accident to St. Yves, Syan-Longboat, the Indian, dropped out of the race after the fourteenth mile. He explained that he felt the effects of an old sunstroke and did not dare run any more. The others, who finished in order were: Matt Maloney, fourth; Simpson, the Canadian Indian, fifth, and Alex Thibeau, Chicago amateur, who turned professional for this race, last.
