THE TOBACCO INDUSTRY

INFORMATION SENT TO SENATE.

President Taft Submits an Exhaustive Report Made by the Bureau of Corporations Regarding the Price of Tobacco—The Bureau Has in Preparation a Complete Report Concerning the Subject and the Operations of Corporations, It is Said, the Information For Which Was Secured in Accordance With Law Creating the Bureau-Tables in Report show Remarkable Increase of Profits to Concerns in Combination.

Washington, June 5 .- Responding a resolution introduced in the Senby Mr. Beveridge, an exhaustive report made by the bureau of cor-porations of information collected afecting the price of tobacco, was sent the Senate to-day by President

It is stated that the bureau has in reparation a complete report covering the subject of the price of tobacco and the operations of corporations, the information for which was secured in accordance with the law creating the bureau. portant material, showing in substance the results of the investigation, is included in a preliminary re-

Commissioner Herbert Knox Smith says that any consideration of the Democratic members of Congress subject of the tobacco industry during recent years is necessarily large a consideration of the relation of the tobacco combination, which controls substantially three-fourths the Republican candidate next year, the business of manufacturing tobacco, other than cigars, in the United States. To show the extent of this business, it is stated that the output of the independent concerns, exclud-000 per year.

According to the report, the American Tobacco Company and other companies in the combination have given the bureau full and ready access to their books and records. From comments made upon the manner keeping books, it appears that the bureau has had less valuable infor mation concerning the conduct of business by individual concerns.

Tables are included in the report showing the remarkable increase of profits to the concerns in the tobac o combination from 1890 to 1897 in-The bureau says it is not prepared at the present time to report in detail on the subject of over capitalization, or in cash value of the good will acquired from time to time by the combination. It is asserted lowever, that the value of good will, which means value of brands of goods manufactured by concerns which were swallowed up by the combination, could not have exceeded a comparatively small fraction of the value assigned to it on the books of the The only reason why combination. the American Tobacco Company, in its early years, was able to earn liberal dividends on its entire capitaliza tion, the report says, lay in its monopoly power.

Among the most interesting subjects taken up is the amount of tax paid by the companies in the tobacco combination to the Federal governs ment in comparison with the profits made by the combination. The report says that the maximum amount if taxes paid, might be expected, was during the years 1899 to 1901, when the war revenue taxes were in force The amount of tax collected fell off greatly in 1902 and 1903, From 1899 to 1993 the taxes fell off about \$8,000,000, while the profits increased about \$13,600,000, rising from \$5, 122,971 in 1899 to \$18,737,889 in 1903
