fier Passengers Had Been Transferred at Morehead Street Bridge For Greater Part of the Day, Temporary Repair is Effected. The break in the overhead bridge

which spans the Southern Railway tracks on Morehead street, occurring Friday night at midnight, was temporarily repaired yesterday afternoon and traffic was resumed after a suspension of more than twelve hours. During the whole of the earlier part of the day passengers were trans-ferred at the bridge, which spans a cut about 60 feet deep. The theory of the street car people is that the effect was produced by the action of smoke from passing rallway locome-tives on the iron work of the bridge. This would appear to be infinitesimal, but it is held, that, continued through long years, it would make itself felt. The bridge will be given continued attention until the break in the ironwork is permanently repaired.




