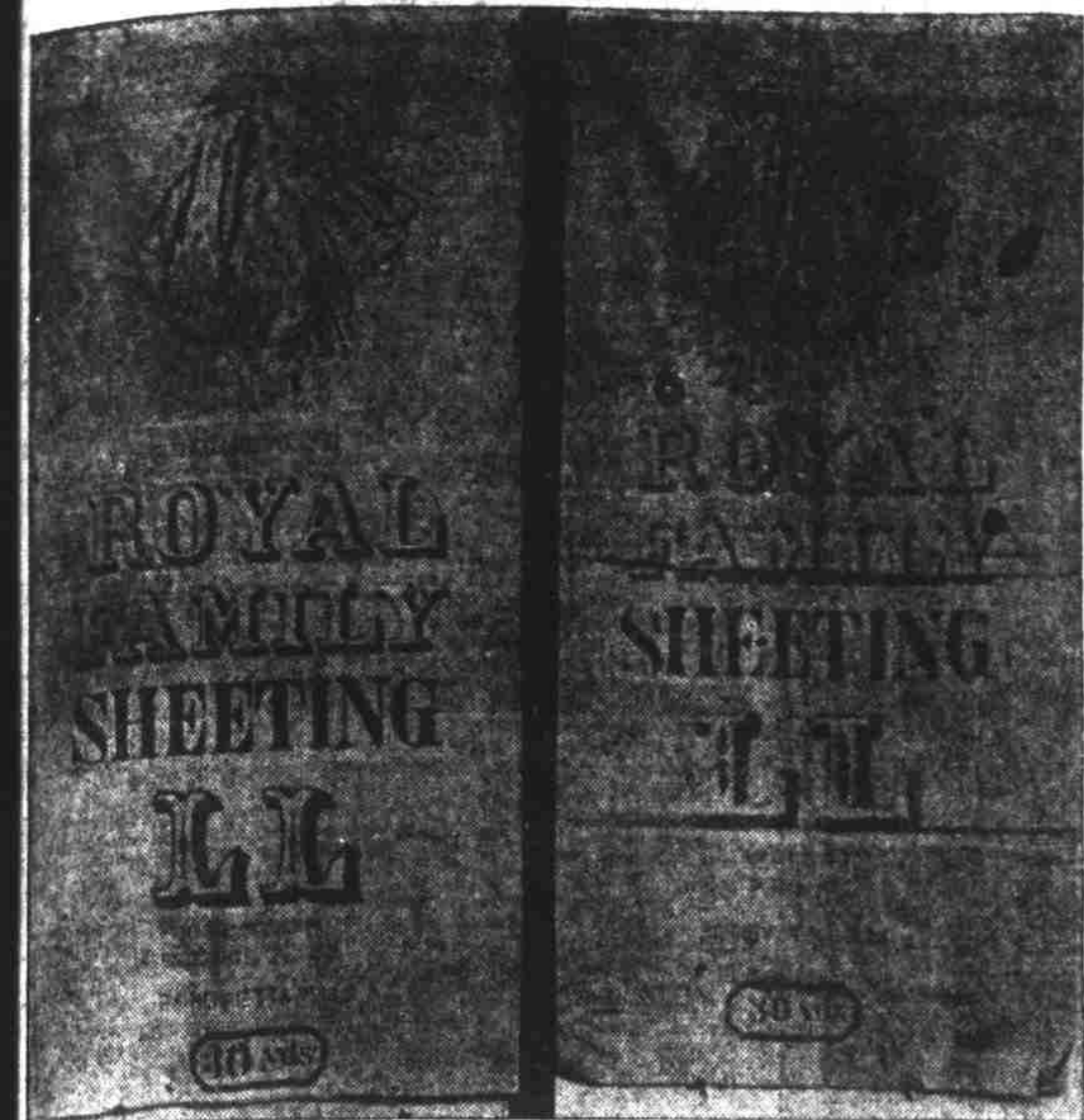


# Foreign Mills Counterfeiting North Carolina Textile Products



The picture to the right is the counterfeit article which the Cooper Mills of England, have been foisting upon the trade, the counterfeit in all details being almost perfect, the dog's head, the brand and the lettering being identical. There is but one difference and that is so slight that it is indistinguishable unless pointed out. Instead of saying manufactured in the United States of America by Henrietta Mills, the fake has it manufactured in England by the Cooper Mills.

The counterfeit specimen of sheeting was secured in Zanzibar, off the east coast of Africa, by the agent of one of the large New York commission houses selling the Royal Family brand of goods. It was sent to Mr. S. B. Tanner, president and treasurer of the Henrietta Mills Company, who immediately, through his agents, took the matter up with the British authorities. As it happened the Royal Family trade mark has been registered in England as well as in the United States and hence Mr. Tanner had little trouble in having the infringement stopped. It shows conclusively, however, to what extremities competing concerns will go in order to procure business. The two specimens of goods, the one genuine and the other counterfeit, have been on exhibition in the rooms of the Southern Manufacturers for the past several weeks and have excited the liveliest interest.

Mr. Tanner states that he has had several infringements of brands but never before such a flagrant one as this. Once before the Royal Family brand was counterfeited but the dog's head was turned the other way. There is little estimating how much counterfeiting of American goods is going on in out-of-the-way places such as Zanzibar. Counterfeits are almost always of inferior quality and this has been the case with the goods fake made by the Cooper Mills which are not to be classed at all with the genuine article.

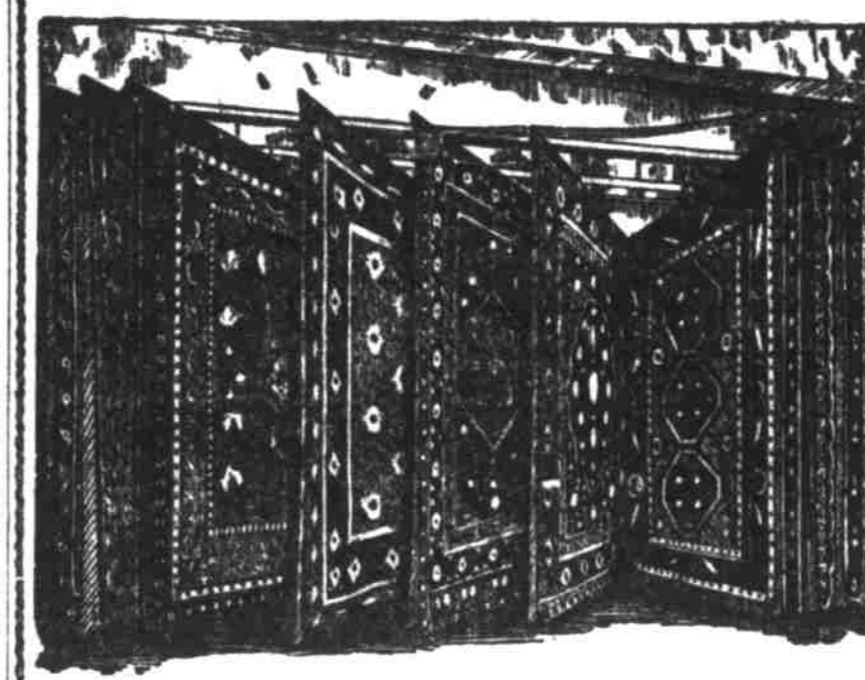

New Orleans, June 5.—Spot cotton quiet and steady, unchanged, middling 19 1/2, sales on the spot 100 bales, to arrive 30. Futures opened quiet at a decline of 5 to 8 points on disappointing cables and somewhat smaller spinner's takings for the week than expected. Selling was general throughout the short session, apparently being about evenly divided between long and short account. It was based chiefly on better weather returns from practically all sections of the belt and on the forecast for fair weather over Sunday. Around the middle of the morning profit taking by scalping shorts caused a partial recovery, but toward noon there was another sag to a level 9 to 11 points below yesterday's final prices. The market closed steady at the lowest of the day.
