

SENATE TAKES NO VOTES

CONSUMES DAY IN DISCUSSION

Income and Corporation Tax Questions Receive Attention For Some Time An Agreement Finally Being Reached That They Should Not Be Taken Up Again Until After the Tariff Provisions Properly Settled—Senator Aldrich Reports Finance Committee's Amendment to the Wood Pulp Paragraph—Hide Amendment Fails of Final Consideration For Lack of Time—Cash Register Question Postponed on Motion of Senator Burton.

Washington, June 19.—The Senate today covered a number of subjects in connection with the tariff, but made final disposition of nothing of importance. Beginning at 10 o'clock the income and corporation tax questions received attention for some time, and ultimately were postponed until the understanding that they should not be taken up again until after the tariff provisions properly settled, finally settled.

Senator Aldrich from the committee on finance brought in the committee's amendment to the wood pulp paragraph, which provided for a provision for granting the duty on wood pulp coming from countries which in the future should be the subject of a treaty to the same rate as that of the country of origin.

All these inquiries were brought to the attention of the Senate at different times during the day but so far as the action on the Senate's side is concerned, the subject before being voted upon by the Senate, Mr. Aldrich also presented the Finance Committee's final report.

The income question went over because of the difficulty of getting the publican members to concur in it until the tariff should be disposed of by the Senate. Mr. Bailey, who has held out for a vote in advance of the completion of the work on the schedules at last conceded the postponement of the understanding that when the subject does come up a vote will be given on the tariff question and not forced on a motion to defer the subject to a committee.

The hide amendment failed of final consideration for the lack of time. It was discussed at length and was still under immediate consideration when the Senate adjourned. The committee's amendment takes the tariff from 10 to 15 per cent, which is the Dingley law. Senator Lodge spoke for nearly three hours in opposition to the provision and Senator Clapp briefly on the same line. There was not time for other speeches, but Senator Warren's four opportunity during the day to make frequent remarks in the interest of the duty.

AN AERIAL HONEYMOON.

Five Thousand People See Bride and Groom Float Off Up Through Cloudland—Incident Unique in Aeronautical History.

Pittsfield, Mass., June 19.—Floating off up through the clouds in the balloon Pittsfield shortly after midnight this morning Roger Noble Burnham, a sculptor and Harvard '94 man, who was Eleanor Howard Waring, an author, also of Brookline, began an aerial honeymoon. The incident is unique in aeronautical history and fully 5,000 people sent up shouts of good will and happiness into the dark night.

The couple were married by the Rev. John Harvey at the summer home of Miss East in Woods Hole yesterday. The couple immediately took the train for Pittsfield, where Mr. Burnham had had a balloon in readiness for a honeymoon trip. The couple arrived here at 10:15 and soon after went to Aero Park. The largest crowd which has yet witnessed a balloon ascension in Pittsfield gathered in front of the building where the balloon was being inflated.

LIGHTNING PLAYS PRANKS.

Nine Men Who Were Huddled in a Signal Tower During Storm, Struck by Lightning, Which Rave Along the Wires For Some Distance.

Valdosta, Ga., June 19.—News was received here today of a disastrous prank played by lightning about midnight last night on the Wicliowee river near Olympia. Eleven men who had been employed in bridge construction there, took refuge during a rain and wind storm in a signal tower. Lightning struck the wires running from the signal tower, ran along them into the tower house and struck the men, who were huddled closely together. Only two were uninjured. One of the nine, a negro, was fatally hurt.

The nine who were injured were all stunned, all of them were badly burned and blistered, some of them having places on their skin torn, as if it had been ripped by a knife held beneath it.

A watch chain worn by one of the men was melted. The watch was unburnt. The trousers on another were ripped from waist band to hem. The tacks in another's shoes were drawn and another's shirt was torn to shreds. The bolt shattered telegraph poles before striking the men in the tower house. Two of the men were so badly injured that surgeons were called to attend them.

Lumber Plant Destroyed by Fire. Augusta, Ga., June 19.—The southeastern portion of the city was threatened this afternoon by fire breaking out in the Dixie Lumber Company's plant. Poor water pressure together with the big headway the fire had gained, gave the firemen a great handicap. The loss will amount to about \$20,000. The entire lumber plant was destroyed.

Trio That Held Up Freight Train Arrested.

Moosokee, Okla., June 19.—One of the trio alleged to have held up a freight train at Brakes, Okla., yesterday when Deputy Kirk was killed, was placed in jail here. He is known as Paul Williams alias Mills and a letter found in his pocket indicates he may be the son of W. F. Mills of Westville, Fla. He is seriously wounded but may recover. Fred Donaldson and Fred Wright, believed to be Williams' accomplices in the alleged hold-up, were arrested this afternoon near Proctor, Okla. Sheriff Clark says the men admitted completely in the robbery, but declared Williams did all the shooting and fired the shot that killed Kirk.
