## Financial and Commercial

#### COTTON MARKET.

New York, June 2. The cotton market had another very sharp advance today establishing new records for the seaof 15 to 21 points. The market opened with the close firm at a net gain firm at an advance of 1 point on July; generally 6 to 10 points higher, in response steady cables, buillsh private crop reports, and a continuation of the ag-gressive bull support noted Saturday. At first July was held back by the circulation of notices, but it soon became evident that there was a demand for all contracts offered, and that position firmed up with the rest of the list.

Realizing was extremely heavy around the initial figures, and in spite of near nth firmness the market sagged off 5 or 6 points during the late forencen with the setback encouraged by better weather South, an idea that progress had been made toward discounting a bullish July bureau, and the natural tendency to anticipete a reaction following such a sharp advance as recently experienced. There was little or no bear pressure, however, and after the market had absorbed reallzing sales to an estimated extent of fully 200,000 bales, the upward movement was resumed accompanied by even greater activity and excitement than had been noted previously since the advance start ed. Some of the biggest trade interests were buyers of the near months, and there was a general demand for late months, but after selling up to 11.66 for December realizing again set in and later

#### STOCK MARKET.

New York, June 28.-The period around July 1 is one, traditionally, of quiet stock This normal tendency was em phasized by several additional circumstances which combined to throw the market into a state of stagnation not approached for many months past. The torrid heat of last week drove many usually active participants in market operations away from Wall Street and with the prospect of a short week to follow with the slosing of the stock exchange next Saturday as well as Monday, as already decided on, there was little incentive to take up activities. After the first hour the market was practically idle. Confidence is unimpaired that the July money settlements will, offer no factor of disturbance and money markets remained in the soft and yielding state that has characterized them for some time past. Engagement of \$2,000,000 gold to-day for shipment to Europe was in spite of showing of growing abundance of money in foreign markets, which lowered the discount rate today both in London and Berlin.

Promise of continued money abundance is a strong factor in keeping alive expectation of future speculative activity. Bonds were steady. Total sales, par value. \$4,647,000.




