## SUFFRAGETTES ARRESTED

### ATTEMPTED TO SEE PREMIER.

Angered by a Letter From the Promier Stating That He Could Not Receive the Deputation, the Suffragettes Slap Inspector in Facq and Attempted to Force Their Way His Office-Police Arrest en by the Scores, the Entire Into His Deputation Eventually Being Taken in Charge-Parliament. Square Was in Continuous Uproar-Win-Government Buildings Smashed With Stones.

London, June 29 .- The thirteenth vain attempt of the militant suffragetts to obtain access to Premier Acquith by deputation resulted in exciting scenes in Parliament Square to-night and the arrest of more than one hundred women. The woman s parliament' assembled in Caxton Hall at & o'clock and sent a deputation, headed by Mrs. Pankhurst, t endeavor to see the Prime Minister who had previously decided not to re ceive the deputation

Enormous crowds of onlookers asembled in the vicinity of Parliament hours before the time set for the raid upon the House, around which everal thousand police had taken op The first notestrategic positions. worthy incident was the arrest, after a great deal of trouble, of a buxom equestrian suffragette, who tried to penetrate the police's ordon to take a message to the Premier Next appeared the deputation under command of Mrs. Pankhurst, and it was received by the crowd with wild cheers. The deputation was met ay Scantlebors . Inspector M. Dave handed Mrs. Pankhurst a letter from the Premier, regretting his mability to receive the deputation.

Angrily throwing the letter on the ground, Mrs. Pankhurst exclaimen. stand on my rights as the bing s subject to enter the House, and she endeavored to force an entrance.

The police began to take the members of the deputation by the arms to Canadian universities, sims at prolead them away. Mrs. Pankhurst voling opportunities to students or stapped Inspector Jarvis in the face. the three countries to obtain some knocking his cap in the mud. There were crics of "shame.

A moment later another member of the deputation, Mrs. Saul Solomon, knocked off the inspiritor's cap a sec-ond time while others inside attempts to rush the cordon of police. Eventualls the entire deputation was placed under arrest


By this a second deputation had left Caxton Hall, accompanied by some hundreds of suffragettes and others, and an attempt was made to reach the House of Commons through the underground passage leading from Westminster bridge.

This, too, was unsuccessful, but for two hours the whole district was in a state of uproar, the police dispersing the crowds and arreating women by the wholesale. The windows of many of the government buildings were smashed with stones wrapped in Daper.

Altogether 112 women were arrested. including Mrs. Pankhurst. Mrs. permanent Solomon, the Hon, Mrs. Haverfield, and many other prominent women.

Just before a o'clock the Prime House unobserved by the rowd. In Hall were Viscountess Harberton, Mrs. Israel Zangwill, Miss \$9,000 Forbes-Robertson, Beatrice Miss Elizabeth Robbins and Miss Heatrice Harraden, besides all the well known

suffragette leaders.


