THE NEWS OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD.

A Batch of Live Items Culled from the Papers of the Adjoining Counties.

CALDWELL
Lenoir News, Aug. 11th.
Mrs. A. F. Hester, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Nelson, died at their home in this place last Friday about 3 p.m. after an illness of several weeks. She was a bride of less than a year and much sympathy is felt for the young husband and bereaved family.

A telegram received last Saturday from Little Rock, Ark., conveys the sad news of the death of Finley Hartley, who left this county several years ago. He was a son of Bert Hartley, a grandson of George Hartley. His mother was a daughter of our Mr. J. H. Johnson.

Last Monday evening during the storm a man by the name of Ragan was killed by lightning near Boone. Ragan and several others took refuge under a tree, Ragan going into the hollow of the tree during the storm and lightning struck the tree, killing Ragan and badly stunning the others, breaking one man's arm. It is thought however that none of the injuries to the others will be permanent.

Our community was shocked Sunday about noon at the sad intelligence of the death of Capt. J. D. Moore at his home in Gastonia. His death was quite sudden and caused by the bursting of a blood vessel while vomiting. He had been in his usual good health up to Sunday morning, when he complained of feeling a little sick and had called a physician, but died a few minutes after the physician came and before he had prescribed. He was a man of large influence and interest, being identified with a dozen or more important enterprises, including the Lenoir cotton mill and the Hudson cotton mill, in all of which he was the leading spirit. Capt. Moore was a native of this county, being born in Globe about 59 years ago. He was buried at Gastonia on last Tuesday.

Other Caldwell Items.
Lenoir Tonic, August 9th.
Mr. J. F. Steele tells us of a heavy rain on Little river last Saturday which washed away several bridges.

The following marriage licenses have been issued since August 1: Lafayette Walker to Mattie Powell, David Icenhour to Mattie Coffey, J. W. Blankenship to Della Carlton, Solomon Dala to Roxanna Michaux.

Mrs. A. F. Hester died Friday afternoon about 2 o'clock and was buried at Belleview cemetery about noon Saturday. Rev. D. P. McGeachy conducted the funeral services. Mrs. Hester had been quite ill for some time and her death was not unexpected.

Mr. Robt. Horton, of Blackstone, died Sunday morning at 7 o'clock and was buried at Horton graveyard Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock. He had been ill for several years with that dreaded disease, consumption, and his death was not unexpected.

A message was received here Monday from Knoxville, Tenn., to the effect that Walter Heffner, a son of J. P. Heffner, who lives near Hudson, had been shot at Maryville, Tenn., Sunday last, and a second message gave the information that the remains were on the way. All that we have been able to learn of the sad affair is that a shooting scrape took place in Maryville and that one of the parties was wounded. Mr. Heffner assisted him into a nearby house and was giving him what attention he could when a shot directed towards the house struck Mr. Heffner, inflicting a wound from which he died as stated above.

CATAWBA.
Newton Enterprise, Aug. 11th.
Leona, the two year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grant Poovy, died Monday morning.

The wife of Mr. Joseph Bollinger, of Hickory township, died Sunday morning. She was well advanced in years and was the mother of Mrs. Frank Bumgarner, of Newton.

Mr. Marion Roseman says there will be very little corn raised on Lysle's creek this year. There have been so many frosts that most of it has been washed out or covered up with mud.

The women and the children on the farms are kept busy now taking care of the great fruit crop. Peaches, apples and pears are ripening faster than they can be worked up. We are told that the Newton merchants never before had such a demand for fruit jars.

The farmers in the Claremont section are the biggest wheat growers in the county. They have never surrendered to the Hessian fly, and have never reduced their planting on account of its crusade in this county. But they were fortunate in being only on the skirmish lines and never had to meet the concentrated Hessian army. Their yields were considerably reduced one or two years below the normal, but never below the cost of production as was the case in the greater part of this county. They kept up their regular system of rotating wheat and clover, and are about back to where they were when the fly made its first visitation. The threshing season is not quite over, but we are indebted to Mr. J. H. Moser for the following reports of some of the largest crops: Mrs. Sallie Huit, 1540 bushels, Noah Huit, 1040; Mrs. A. C. Boggs, 987; J. M. Arndt, 1270; J. H. C. Huit, 500; John S. Little, 500; B. M. Morrow, 475; E. S. Little, 360. Mrs. Sallie Huit is still the largest wheat farmer in the county. Mr. George Yount, who always makes from 700 to 1000 bushels, has not yet threshed. Wheat is selling this year at \$1.00 a bushel. This means that the eight crops reported from a small section around Claremont will bring \$6,672.

Sinclair, were with him Saturday, returning to Marion Saturday night. Dr. Martin returned to Baltimore Saturday night.

Boone Democrat, August 10th.

By inquiring from the corn crop of the county this week we learn that in many sections the prospects are not by any means flattering. The crop is failing to ear in many instances.

Ex-Sheriff A. H. Boyd, of Caldwell, is in town this week. We are sorry to learn that the Sheriff will leave within the next few weeks for Montana, where he will make his future home.

Possibly the most severe storm that ever visited this section broke in all its fury at night on last Monday, and for a while it seemed that the village would be inundated by the raging waters, demolished by the terrible rush of wind or shattered by the fierce lightning that played incessantly in the warring elements. It seemed that Boone was the center of the storm; it appearing that three clouds met almost centrally over the village, and the scene that followed was indescribable. The sparkling streams that ripple through the village were converted into roaring torrents and fences, bridges, etc., were swept away before the resistless rivulets. Panic reigned supreme—shade trees were uprooted, and the electricity played hide and seek among the timber. A mule belonging to the harness man and standing on the public square was knocked from his feet by a flash of lightning. The elements were so darkened in the afternoon that His Honor adjourned court until Tuesday morning. The scene was one of horror, and one we hope never to witness again.
