May Send a Warship to Relieve an American Citizen in Nicaragua.

Washington Dispatch, 13th. There is good reason to believe that the State Department has perfected plans for sending a warship to assist William L. Merry, United States minister at Costa Rica and Nicaragua, in securing satisfaction from the Nicaraguan government, which now holds William S. Albers, an American citizen, together with his brother, in prison at Ocotal on charges beheved by the State Department to be thoroughly unfounded.

Ocotal is a small place in the provience of Segovia, Nicaragua, a few miles from the Honduras line. Albers has been in jail there Mr. F. A.
