**KILLED BY NEGRO IN GEORGIA.**

**Newton Man's Remains Taken to McDowell County Monday for Burial.**

Stateville Landmark, 15th.

The remains of Mr. J. W. Cowan, of Newton, who was mortally wounded by a negro near Midville, Ga., last Wednesday and died in an Augusta hospital Saturday night at 12 o'clock, passed through Stateville yesterday morning en route to McDowell county, where the interment takes place to-day. The remains were accompanied by Mrs. Cowan, wife of the deceased, Mr. J. S. Cowan, of Waynesville, a brother, and Messrs. C. H. Robinson and Jas. T. Compton, of Charlotte. Mrs. Cowan was called to Georgia soon after the shooting occurred

and was with her husband when the end came, and Mr. Cowan, of Waynesville, and friends from Charlotte arrived in Augusta shortly after his death.

Mr. Cowan was a traveling representative of C. H. Robinson & Co., of Charlotte, and was at Midville collecting for the firm when he was shot in the face with a shotgun by a negro. His relatives have no particulars of the tragedy but it is assumed that Mr. Cowan had called on the negro to collect some money when the shooting occurred. When the party accompanying the remains left Augusta Sunday they were assured that every effort would be made to capture the murderer; that a posse was hot on his trail at the time.

Mr. Cowan leaves a wife and four children.

**Organization of the Second Baptist Church of Morganton.**

Please give us space in your valuable paper for the following: A council composed of Rev. W. R. Bradshaw, State Evangelist, Rev. James Long, pastor of Morganton Baptist church, Rev. J. P. Hagaman and Deacons R. C. Whittner and F. E. Cook, of Mt. Home church, having been called for the purpose of organizing the Second Baptist church

of Morganton, the council met at Anderson Mission Chapel, on the Hospital road, Thursday night, Nov. 10th, 1910. Rev. W. R. Bradshaw preached the sermon from the text: "Lovest thou me." It was a great sermon. After the sermon the council was organized by electing Rev. James Long moderator and F. E. Cook secretary. Letters were called for and 63 members were enrolled, and the Second Baptist church of Morganton was organized and declared a duly constituted church by the council.

A church conference was held and Rev. J. P. Hagaman was called to pastoral care of the church, and W. L. Kirksey was elected church clerk. A board of trustees was elected with W. L. Kirksey chairman.

As soon as a suitable lot can be secured a house will be built. This church promises to become one of the strongest churches of the county.

**Preventive Treatment for Oat and Wheat Smut.**

Bulletin 212 of the North Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station by Dr. F. L. Stevens, which has just appeared from the press, gives full directions for preventing the various smuts of oats and wheat. These are due to little living parasitic plants which grow within the wheat and oat plants. They cause large loss, cutting down the yield of grain often as much as 20 per cent, or even 30 per cent., while the stinking smut of wheat does much greater damage by injuring the milling quality of the grain. The formalin treatment, which is thoroughly effective and costs almost nothing, is described and recommended for oat smut. The same treatment is even more effective than the ordinary bluestone treatment for the stinking smut in wheat. The loose smut of wheat can be prevented by a modified hot water treatment coupled with separate growth of seed in a protected seed plat. Director C. B. Williams, West Raleigh, N. C., states that those

diseases cause thousands upon thousands of dollars of loss every year to the oat and wheat crops of the State and that this bulletin was prepared especially to give farmers at this time the latest and most effective means of combating these diseases. In strange contrast to the noisy atmosphere which was wont to pervade Sagamore Hill is the almost impenetrable silence which has fallen over the mansion since Tuesday's cyclone. Those who know Mr. Roosevelt (and who doesn't?) would have declared that he would be the last man on earth to take defeat so seriously as to shut himself up in seclusion and "weep in silence and alone." It is so unlike the man that even the "pert paragraphers" have paused in the manipulation of their artillery to learn whether or not some dire malady has seized the Mighty Hunter.

The New York World suggests that the Silent One is communing with the spirits of the dead. It says:

"Three days have passed and a silence like that of the tomb still broods over Sagamore Hill. The lips upon which hung the faithful in rapt adoration are mute. Not a sound is heard, not a funeral note. The pathway up which only a few days ago climbed those seeking grace and guidance is deserted. A guard in black mans the doorway and dismisses the stray intruder with hushed voice and warning finger laid upon his lips. The house bell is muffled, the telephone disconnected. Let no whisper dis-

turb the peace of the solemn scene, no footfall grate upon the ear of meditation.
